SUMMARY OF UCD SMURFIT SCHOOL STUDENTS' PATHWAYS

STAMP 2 (STUDENT PERMISSION)

What is Stamp 2 - the Student Permission?

It is an immigration permission allowing the holder to study a full-time course on the official Interim List of Eligible Programmes (ILEP) for a specified period, subject to conditions.

What are working rights on Stamp 2 permission?

In term time working rights: Students can work part time in term (up to 20 hours per week). Term time dates are defined as 1 October - 31 May.

Out of term time working rights: Students' working rights permission extends to full time (up to 40 hours per week). Out of term dates are defined as: 15 December – 15 January and 1 June – 30 September (all summer)

What is the transition from Stamp 2 permission to Stamp 1G permission?

Students can apply for Stamp 1G permission while on a valid Stamp 2 permission.

The earliest our students can submit their Stamp 1G application is the last week of September (when their UCD Academic Transcript is released).

The application processing time is usually 3-5 weeks. Please note the mentioned time is based on currently available information here and may be subject to change.

INTERNSHIPS ON STAMP 2 (STUDENT PERMISSION)

Can students undertake internships during the academic programme?

Students can undertake internships during the programme, but it cannot impact their class attendance which is a priority.

Internships are an integral part of some of our programmes.

UCD Smurfit School Programmes are typically 12 months long with most classes finishing by the end of July.

When can students on Stamp 2 permission undertake internships?

Paid internships are permitted provided they are an integral part of the academic programme, are accredited, and contribute to the student's final award. During term time, students are allowed to work part-time, up to 20 hours per week. However, they may work full-time, up to 40 hours per week, during the designated holiday periods of 15 December to 15 January and 1 June to 30 September.

Are there any restrictions for students on Stamp 2 permission when undertaking internships?

Employment cannot be in a self-employed capacity.

Internships must be an integral part of a curriculum contributing to the final award.

Educational facilities must ensure that the placements are suited to the programme being pursued.

Internships cannot exceed 50% of the total duration of the academic programme. For instance, if you are completing a 4-year programme, you can complete up to 2 years of internship.

Can Students on a Stamp 2 permission undertake an unpaid internship?

Students may undertake an unpaid internship; however, class attendance remains a priority and must not be affected. Internships form an integral part of certain programmes, particularly at UCD Smurfit School, where programmes typically run for 12 months, with most classes concluding by the end of July.

INTERNSHIPS ON STAMP 2 (STUDENT PERMISSION)

What is a Stamp 1G (Graduate Permission)?

The Stamp 1G Graduate Permission, also known as the Third Level Graduate Programme, allows international students who have completed a Level 8 or Level 9 award from a recognised Irish higher education institution to remain in Ireland after their studies.

Graduates with a Level 8 award may be granted Stamp 1G permission for 12 months, during which they have the right to live and work in Ireland without the need for an employment permit.

Graduates with a Level 9 award may initially receive 12 months of Stamp 1G permission and can apply for a further 12-month extension, provided they are not already on a sponsored employment permit by the end of the first year.

The purpose of this permission is to support recent graduates in gaining relevant work experience and to facilitate their progression towards securing a General Employment Permit or a Critical Skills Employment Permit.

Who is eligible for Stamp 1G permission?

Non-EEA graduates of UCD may be eligible for the Stamp 1G Graduate Permission if they meet the following conditions:

- They have completed their degree in Ireland
- They hold a Level 9 qualification (Master's degree) awarded by a recognised Irish awarding body (e.g. UCD)
- They currently hold a valid Stamp 2 student immigration permission

Does Stamp 1G require sponsorship from the employer?

No, there is no requirement from a prospective employer to be involved. Students have flexibility to change employers and to work in any sector.

How long can our graduates avail of Stamp 1G permission?

Graduates may be granted Stamp 1G permission for an initial period of 12 months.

Those who have completed a **master's degree** (Level 9 NFQ) may be eligible to renew their permission for an additional 12 months, allowing for a maximum of 24 months in total under the Stamp 1G Graduate Programme.

GENERAL EMPLOYMENT PERMIT & CRITICAL SKILLS EMPLOYMENT PERMIT

GENERAL EMPLOYMENT PERMIT

A General Employment Permit allows you to work in occupations where it's deemed that there is a labour shortage in Ireland.

In order to meet the requirements for a General Employment Permit, the role must:

- Pay a minimum of 34k yearly, based on a 39-hour working week. (Please note, should the working hours differ from 39 hours weekly, the minimum salary threshold adjusts to suit this. Minimum salary thresholds are subject to change yearly at the discretion of the DETE)
- Fit into a Standard Occupational Code (SOC) that does not appear on the ineligible list located here.

Points to note for GEP applications:

- A Labour Market Needs Test is required on all GEP applications, unless they meet one of four exceptions.
- GEP's are issued for two years initially (unless the contract is less) and can then be renewed for a further three years.
- Dependent family members must wait 12 months before joining the applicant in Ireland.
- GEP holders are subject to the 9-month rule and must remain with their initial employer on their employment permit for 9 months before being eligible to change

to an alternative employer.

CRITICAL SKILLS EMPLOYMENT PERMIT (CSEP)

A Critical Skills Employment Permit is designed for highly skilled roles that are not usually filled with applicants from Ireland or the EEA.

To meet the requirements for a CSEP, the role must:

- Have a minimum contract of two years.
- Pay a minimum of 38k yearly based on a 39-hour working week.
- (please note, should the working hours differ from 39 hours weekly, the minimum salary threshold adjusts to suit this. Minimum salary thresholds are subject to change yearly at the discretion of the DETE)
- Fit into a Standard Occupational Code (SOC) that appears on the Critical Skills list, located here. (if salary is under 64k). Should the salary be over 64k, the role can fit into any SOC, once not located on the ineligible list.

Points to note for CSEP applications:

- Applicants must hold a third level degree that is directly relevant to the role being applied for. (when the salary is below 64K)
- Issued for 2 years and renewals are not normally required as applicants can move towards a Stamp 4 IRP card after 2 years.
- Dependent family members can join the applicant immediately.
- Labour Market Needs Tests are not required.

Stamp 2 (student permission)

Stamp 1A * permission (accountancy training) Students receive a one-year Stamp 1, which can be renewed only if they hold a Master's degree and have not yet secured sponsorship.

General **Employment Permit** or **Critical Skills Employment**

Permit

Stamp 4 ** is a longer-term immigration permission that students may be eligible for after spending time on a **General Employment** Permit or a Critical Skills **Employment Permit. It is** typically considered as the next step following an employment permit.

- Stamp 1G permission:
- Suitable for majority of employers
- No sponsorship required

- Stamp 1A permission is aimed at accountancy trainees
- ** Stamp 4 is a permission students typically consider after an employment permit

SUMMARY OF THE UCD SMURFIT SCHOOL STUDENTS' **PATHWAYS**

PERMISSION	LENGTH	COST (€)	ADDITIONAL INFORMATION
Stamp 2	1 year	300	Student immigration permission. Allows part-time work (up to 20 hours/week) during term time and full-time work (up to 40 hours/week) between 1 June–30 September and 15 December–15 January.
Stamp 1G (Graduate Permission)	1 year initially + 1 year renewal (Master's graduates only)	300	Granted to graduates on Stamp 2 permission. No employer sponsorship required. Initially valid for 12 months, with a further 12-month extension available to Master's degree holders who have not yet secured a sponsored employment permit. Application is submitted by the student. Processing time: approx. 3–5 weeks.
Stamp 1A (Trainee Accountant Permission)	2 years	300	For students undergoing accountancy training. Once on Stamp 1A, students cannot switch to Stamp 1G. Application is submitted by the student.
General Employment Permit	3 months – 2 years (initially)	1,000	For roles with a minimum salary of \in 34,000. The employment offer must meet eligibility and labour market needs test requirements. Applicants cannot transfer to Stamp 1G once on this permit. Application can be made by either the employer or the applicant. Processing times and employer change guidelines apply.
Critical Skills Employment Permit	2 years	1,000	For highly skilled roles with a minimum salary of $\&$ 38,000. Designed to lead to Stamp 4 after two years. Applicants cannot transfer to Stamp 1G once on this permit. Application can be submitted by the employer or applicant. Processing times and employer change guidelines apply.
